## Restoration and Infrastructure – Priorities

- Execute DMAF agreements with INFC and TRCA's municipal partners to allow invoicing for work completed to date
- Finalize a Durham Planting and Reforestation Program delivery program
- Updating existing agreements with Parks Canada, Pickering, Brampton, Markham, Richmond Hill and York Region while MOUs are executed
- New agreements in works for restoration projects (Paul Coffey Park and King's Park) in Mississauga that could lead to overarching City of Mississauga SLA
- TTP long-term plan for shoreline stabilization being prepared to inform discussions with Ports Toronto
- Implement Divisional realignment that was effective November 18, 2019







### **R&I Realignment**

- 213 FT and 100+ contract staff
- TRCA's largest division
- ~\$50M in annual capital and special capital projects and programs
  - erosion hazard identification, assessment and mitigation works to protect municipal infrastructure and public safety
  - applied restoration works to improve and enhance aquatic and terrestrial habitat
  - Wide range of other natural resources management projects and programs such as forestry management and environmental monitoring
- Restoration and Infrastructure is now comprised of five business units:
  - Construction Services
  - Professional Services
  - Restoration and Resource Management Projects
  - Engineering Projects
  - Environmental Monitoring and Data Management

## Restoration and Infrastructure – Challenges

 Changes in procurement policies and procedures have necessitated updates to scheduling practices



- R&I is adapting well and will be better positioned in 2020
- Additional resources will be required for 2020 to deliver DMAFrelated projects
  - R&I Campus will need ongoing support for upgrades to accommodate additional staff, vehicles & equipment



- Potential opportunity for staff with expertise to address R&I needs
- No. of bids on common aggregate below average





- Less supply due to more infrastructure projects
- Bid bond requirements have been limiting for some vendors

## Restoration and Infrastructure – Required Cooperation



R&I will require support from HR to recruit field/coop staff in 2020 to ensure early recruitment and highquality applicants are

obtained



Support from ITM to select new scheduling, task management and safety training/certification tracking software and prioritize updates to various R&I databases



Securing trail connections through planning and development review process and working with municipal partners on agreements to put the TRCA Trail Strategy into action



Work with HR, Corporate Services and ITM on Divisional realignment implementation
